Never, Never Quit!

'Commit your actions to the LORD, and your plans will succeed.'

Proverbs 16:3

The moment you start believing you're successful enough to rest on your laurels, you're in trouble. You've put a lid on your growth! Solomon wrote, 'Do you know a hard-working man? He shall be successful and stand before kings!' (Proverbs 22:29 TLB). Success is always a possibility, but never a guarantee. News from the Prayer, Praise and Bible Study Group. (September Notes)



This month we had Andrew Rome lead our studies. He took the book of Titus for us to study. Titus is a personal letter and, unlike the letters Paul wrote to churches it is not structured, but written as a letter to a friend, who he was sending to Crete to put things right in the church there. There are three main themes which keep recurring in this book and we looked at each of these in turn:

- <u>1. Salvation</u> from Chapter 1 we discovered this is the hope of eternal life it is not just something for the here and now but looks forward to heaven. This hope is sure as we have a God who does not lie and can be trusted. Of ourselves we would never understand this, but he has revealed it to us, and it came at just the right time. Chapter 2 shows us we have done nothing to deserve this grace, and it is for all people. God gave himself for us to redeem us and every part of us has been redeemed. His purity has been credited to us so we can be special people for him. Chapter 3 tells us that we are no better than anybody else, as we were all once bad, and we are saved by mercy, we do not work it up for ourselves, it comes from God and we are renewed-the three persons of the Trinity are all involved in salvation-God initiated it, Jesus came to provide it and the Holy Spirit comes to live in our hearts. We see the holiness, purity and condescension of God and we should proclaim it.
- 2. Believers behaviour At that time Crete was notorious for its bad behaviour-they were liars, lazy, and had no gentleness are there parallels for us today? We then looked at the characteristics of old men, old women, young women and young men mentioned in Chapter 2 which represent family life .We looked at how they relate to each other and how each should behave so that their lives would not cause offence and be faithful so people would see their behaviour would be like people of God. Slaves are mentioned and urged to be subject to their masters, and fully trustworthy so their relationship is in stark contrast to those around and be attractive to others. From Chapter 3 we saw how we relate to the society around us, that we should be good citizens and have a willingness to obey laws, to participate in things that are right and good so we can actively contribute to society and be

at peace with all. The purpose of all this is to bless ourselves and be a witness to others. We are not saved by our good works but to do good works.

3. Role of leaders - the leadership of the church should be of elders and deacons. The character traits of both of these seem similar, but elders have the ability to teach and should be specifically male, whereas deacons who also should hold onto the truth can be women. This was borne out by other scriptures. Both should serve the church and their roles do overlap. It was noted that Paul used as his starting point the word of God and not the cultural view. We then looked specifically at Chapter 1 verses 5-9 where Titus is asked to appoint elders in every town. Verse 6 emphasises the spiritual characteristics. verses 7-9 emphasise the personal qualities both negative and positive, and it was noted that these reflect the fruits of the world and the spirit given in Galatians which shows that the Holy Spirit should live in them and produce fruit. They should have a clear conviction, understand doctrine be brave and firm but also warm and caring.

Porch redecoration

The members of Renhold Chapel are intending to replace the inner front door with a glazed door opening inwards. This will improve access to the building & avoid the two sets of doors clashing with each other.

At the same time we will be redecorating the porch area to make it more welcoming. It is estimated that the works will cost around £4000 including redecoration & changes to the electrics. The Story of The Poppy

During the First World War (1914–1918) much of the fighting took place in Western Europe. Previously beautiful countryside was blasted, bombed and fought over, again and again. The landscape swiftly turned to fields of mud: bleak and barren scenes where little or nothing could grow.

Bright red Flanders poppies (Papaver rhoeas) however, were delicate but resilient flowers and grew in their thousands, flourishing even in the middle of chaos and destruction. In early May 1915, shortly after losing a friend in Ypres, a Canadian doctor, Lt Col John McCrae was inspired by the sight of poppies to write a now famous poem called 'In Flanders Fields'.

McCrae's poem inspired an American academic, Moina Michael,

to make and sell red silk poppies which were brought to England by a French woman, Anna Guérin. The (Royal) British Legion, formed in 1921, ordered 9 million of these poppies and sold them on 11 November that year. The poppies sold out almost immediately and that first ever 'Poppy Appeal' raised over £106,000; a considerable amount of money at the time. This was used to help WW1 veterans with employment and housing.



The following year, Major George Howson set up the Poppy Factory to employ disabled ex-Servicemen. Today, the factory and the Legion's warehouse in Aylesford produces millions of poppies each year.

The demand for poppies in England was so high that few were reaching Scotland. Earl Haig's wife established the 'Lady Haig Poppy Factory' in Edinburgh in 1926 to produce poppies exclusively for Scotland. Over 5 million Scottish poppies (which have four petals and no leaf unlike poppies in the rest of the UK) are still made by hand by disabled ex-Servicemen at Lady Haig's Poppy Factory each year and distributed by the Royal British Legion's sister charity Poppy Scotland.
